RECEIPT FROM 17th 'HEALER' FOUND IN YOUGHAL ATTIC

A family renovating a newly purchased house in Youghal have discovered a 17th century land sale receipt signed by historical figure and alleged healer Valentine Greatrakes.

The handwritten acknowledgement of £860/6/7 was one of several intriguing items found in a house in Grattan Street that was formerly the home of the late seaman Mikey O'Brien.

Other discovered artefacts include a plaster bust of Irish Home Rule campaigner and Land League reformist Charles Stewart Parnell

The house's new residents are Aimee O'Connor and her sons Daniel (11) and 20 year-old Loughlin who arrived in Youghal last October from Waterford city.

Cures, witches and critics

Valentine Greatrakes was believed by many to have miraculous healing powers and criticised by others who saw him as a well-meaning quack who couldn't cure a side of bacon let alone a life-threatening disease. Others labelled him a Satanist, a Republican instigator or just deluded. He was also a witch hunter and was one of the 'witch testers' in the trial of alleged Youghal witch Florence Newton, in Youghal in 1661.

A former Cromwellian soldier, Greatrakes was born in Affane, west Waterford on February 14th 1628. His alleged healing talents first emerged in 1662 when he claimed to have experienced an 'impulse' to cure what was termed 'the king's evil' or scrofula -a tuberculosis derivative affecting the neck.

Deeply religious, he soon proclaimed a God-given ability to cure an increasing variety of maladies, from migraine to blindness to cancers. He offered free treatments in rudimentary 'clinics' he set up in barns and stables in west Waterford and in Youghal. An associate of the Boyle family, he is believed to have lived for awhile in Myrtle Grove. Sometimes he

succeeded in his task and sometimes not but regardless, attracted huge crowds.

Greatrakes (sometimes spelled Greatraks) earned the nickname 'The Stroker' because he would 'stroke' the afflicted area, while allegedly praying and sometimes applying his own saliva simultaneously. Those who claimed to have been healed said their pains would transfer to their extremities before dissipating completely.

Eventually the Bishop of Lismore, staunchly unimpressed, forbade Greatrakes from laying hands (or spit!) on anyone due to not having a physician's licence from the Church to do so, as was the norm.

Undeterred, Greatrakes continued his vocation, his mission taking twice him to England where his powers failed before the King but where he found better results when decamping to London slums. He eventually grew disenchanted with the mixed reviews and retired to farming for his final decades before dying in Affane in 1683.

Tucked away

The Greatrakes receipt was discovered in a glass case alongside a brief biography of the 'healer'. "It was wrapped in paper and stuffed in an attic corner", says Loughlin. A small inscription on the case names Youghal printer Thomas Field, who married a cousin of the Youghal shop's previous owner, John Lyndsay and whose only child was present proprietor Bill Field

The receipt is dated May 7th 1680, three years before Greatrakes died and relates to a land sale. The text is quite ornate, difficult in parts to decipher and involves a deal between its author and a family member. An estimated deciphering reads as follows:

Received from my cousin Mister Barry Perot the sum of six hundred & eighty pounds, seven shillings & five pence in payments for rents due to me for his holdings in the County of Limerick of Robert

The receipt is signed: 'Greatraks', but also references to others present, namely W Greatraks, who was probably his father, Thomas Croker and John Neesham, notary public (civil servant involved in business matters).

Land transaction

Local historian and chartered engineer David Kelly says the receipt is interesting "not particularly because of Greatrakes, who was renowned more locally than nationally or internationally, but for the considerable sum of money involved. Cromwellian solders were often given land upon retirement", he explains, "and Greatrakes was a farmer by trade". David estimated that land values in 1680 "may have been under £5 per acre, which would suggest a very large tract of land was involved".

The historian adds that the transaction has no direct connection with Youghal and would not describe the receipt itself to be of high monetary value, despite its historic interest.

As for the Stroker's reputation, David notes that he seems not to have contracted any disease himself from his patients and feels he may have treated people with minor ailments that would fade in time anyway.

Shipwreck tragedy

Aimee O'Connor was born in Dublin but grew up in Vancouver, Canada before returning to Ireland at 17. Speaking of strong family links to the east Cork/west Waterford region she says her great grandfather on the paternal side "was Daniel Lawton, a policeman who was involved in a well-known ship rescue attempt in Ardmore in 1911".

Constable Lawton was one of seven men who rushed to assist the crew of the schooner Teaser, which sank in a ferocious storm. The policeman pulled a fellow rescuer from the water before being himself being similarly rescued shortly afterwards when a crew mate pulled him back on board by grabbing his belt. "That belt hung in our family home in Lismore for decades in recognition of it saving his life", says Aimee. Sadly all hands on board the Teaser were lost. The seven men who tried to save them were later awarded medals by amongst others, King F George V, in London.

More contemporaneously, Aimee's dad hails from Lismore, as does his brother Jimmy who lives in Ardmore. Another brother, Pat, is a successful film director (ITALICS: Ballroom of Romance, Cal, Circle of Friends), in New York.

Further finds

Back in Grattan Street, the bust pertaining to Charles Stewart Parnell is likely to be one of many such works coated and sold as copies of an original in the early 20th century. Similar examples have apparently been exhibited in Dublin and in Waterford.

Other items discovered at the house to date include a samples of Youghal bricks, two large display cases of world flags, vintage, unopened bottles of spirits from around the glove reflective of Mikey's sea travels and a marvellous gentleman's wardrobe with itemised drawers carefully labelled.

The compact back yard features as set of three wall murals depicting Youghal scenes and Ardmore tower. The stone storage house where the bust was discovered is externally ornated with crests of Ireland's four provinces. Its interior, choc-a-bloc with paraphernalia, may divulge further curios and historic items in due course.

"Its a gorgeous house with a wonderful atmosphere", says Aimee, "and whatever alterations we undertake will be done with utmost respect for its history and the people who have previously lived here".

N25 CARRIGTOHILL TO MIDLETON UPGRADE PUBLIC CONSULTATION NO. 2 – DISPLAY OF PREFERRED ROUTE OPTION

Members of the public are invited to have their say on the N25 Carrigtohill to Midleton Transport Infrastructure Upgrade.

Cork County Council in partnership with Transport Infrastructure Ireland are progressing development of a transport infrastructure improvement scheme along the N25 between Carrigtohill and Midleton. The scheme study area runs along the N25 commencing at the Barryscourt Interchange at Carrigtohill and extending to the Oatencake Interchange at Midleton.

The proposed scheme objectives include improving the efficiency and safety of the N25 between Carrigtohill and Midleton, facilitating improved facilities for cyclists and pedestrians between the two towns, improvements to public transport connectivity and provisions of safe access to strategic development sites.

The project is currently at Phase 2 (Options Selection) of Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) Project Management Guidelines. Following the first public consultation last year which presented the feasible route options within the study area, the Stage 2 Option Selection Process has now been completed. This process assessed the various route options under 6 criteria: Economy, Environment, Safety, Accessibility and Social Inclusion, Integration, and Physical Activity to identify the Preferred Option. The assessment determined an impact score for each criterion in accordance with the TII Multi Criteria Analysis and these scores established preferences between options. Each option was then critically reviewed and the process concluded that the Red Route Option performed best in meeting the scheme objectives.

The Preferred Route Option includes for a new interchange at Ballyadam, alterations to the existing Barryscourt and Oatencake interchanges, new parallel link roads and an Active Travel facility along the full length of the scheme.

The Preferred Route is displayed as a corridor with an indicative alignment of the road and active travel facility shown within the corridor. The corridor indicates the lands within which the N25 scheme can be developed, it does

not represent the actual width of the road or lands to be acquired. The exact details of the land take and property impacts will be developed during the next phase of the Planning and Design Process.

In accordance with current Covid-19 guidance, and in order to protect the public and project staff from the risk of transmission, it is not possible to hold a public event at this time. Instead, Cork County Council are holding an online public consultation event and window displays of the current information.

The Preferred Route Option is on display from Wednesday 21st July until Wednesday the 8th of September 2021. During this non-statutory public consultation we are inviting comment and feedback. Drawings showing the Preferred Route Option and further information on the project are available for inspection at the following locations:



MUNTER JUVENILE CHAMPIONSHIPS Avril Millerick won Munster Double Gold & set a new Munster outdoor record. Avril won the U17 3000M race setting a new Munster record of 10.39 and went on to win gold again in the 1500M.

Avril Cashman won Gold in the U18 2000M Steeple Chase event in an impressive time of 7.40 and medalled again in the U18 3000M where she took Silver

Sorcha Kilgannon & Poppi Devereaux both impressed in the U16 Pole Vault where Sorcha won Gold with a PB jump of 2M 56cm & Poppi won Silver with a PB jump of 2M 41cm. Emma Landers just back from injury had a super run in the U18 1500M to win Silver in a time of 4.56. Ciaran McNamee won Bronze in the U19 3000M in a time of 9.34. Ciaran again competed in the 1500M event where he finished 4th in a time of 4.24.

Jude Buckley had an excellent run in the U16 800M race finishing 6th overall in an impressive time of 2.11, Jude also competed in the U16 1500M finishing finishing 6th again with a time of 4.50.

Dylan Cairns qualified from the 200M heat to the U15 200M final where he had an excellent run finishing 6th overall in a time of 29.28 seconds.

Clodagh Walsh had a great run finishing 6th overall in the U12 600M in a time of 1 55

Orla Motherway & Aine Collins also had excellent runs in the same event in times of 2.21 & 2.13 respectively.



Youghal RNLI help a swimmer in trouble in Youghal harbour

The Volunteer crew of Youghal RNLI responded to their pagers on Sunday 18th July at 3.09pm to a report of a swimmer in trouble between The Mall beach and Greenhole beach in Youghal harbour.

Arriving on scene within minutes, the crew discovered the male swimmer had made it to shore. Two of the lifeboat crew assessed his condition on shore and realised he was suffering with mild hyperthermia. He was transferred onto a stretcher and conveyed to the lifeboat station. Youghal Coast Guard unit provided assistance at the scene.

Once back at the station the casualty was given medical assistance by paramedics and taken to Cork University Hospital by ambulance, where he is expected to make a full recovery.

Speaking after the call out Mark Nolan, Youghal RNLI volunteer Deputy Launching Authority said; 'With the good weather forecast for the next few days I'd like to remind people to take care near the water, never swim alone and always let someone on shore know where you are going and a rough time of when they can expect you back'

Ballycotton RNLI launched to report of possible boat on fire between Knockadoon and Ballycotton island.

On Friday 16th July at 9.08pm Ballycotton RNLI's all-weather Trent class lifeboat the Austin Lidbury was tasked by Valentia Coast Guard to a report of a boat on fire in the bay between Knockadoon and Ballycotton island. Conditions were very calm with clear visibility.

Ballycotton RNLI's volunteer crew launched the lifeboat immediately under Duty Coxswain Michael Hallahan with six crew members onboard.

Conditions were calm with clear visability. Youghal RNLI, the Irish Coast Guard helicopter Rescue 117 and Youghal Coast Guard were also tasked. Following several searches of the area at 10.30pm all rescue teams were stood down and the call out was treated as a false alarm with good intent.

MICHAEL'S TALES OF PASTURES NEAR AND FAR

A familiar figure outside the entrance to the Farmers' Market for the past few months is that of now-Midleton resident Michael O'Connor displaying and selling copies of his recently published book of memories titled 'Pastures Near and Far'.

The delightful 96-page volume depicts Michael's much-travelled life, from his childhood days growing up on a farm near Charleville, to his secondary schools days in the prestigious Clongowes Wood College, his various employments before he along with wife Mary and son Rory relocated to Midleton where there now reside at Millbrook Court.

"We're living now in Midleton for 20 years, since 2001," Michael explains. "The people we were renting from in Cork said they wanted to sell out the house so we moved to Midleton. The first day we arrived we called to Miah McGrath's Auctioneers and we were delighted to be told a house had just come up for rent that morning.

"We moved here to Millbrook Court about a year-and-a-half later and are delighted to be here. We found the Midleton people to be very welcoming and very nice to us in every way. Our son, Rory, went to Midleton CBS and he's now working from home for a call centre."

Michael's writing career goes back over two or three decades and most of the articles in the book have previously appeared in such publications like Ireland's Own, The Cork Holly Bough and the Evening Echo. He even got to read out one of his stories - titled 'The Shine off of that Bull' - on the iconic RTE Radio Sunday Morning show, Sunday Miscellany.

From those many tales came the idea of a book, although, as he says, it was never planned. "A few years ago we were down in Allihies for a weekend and we got to know a fisherman-cum painter called Nealie O'Sullivan who wrote a book one winter about his life. Mary said to me 'Michael, you have that book already writ-

ten; all you have to do is to put your pieces together'. So about two-and-a-half years ago I got in touch with Wan Waterman in Carrig Print about getting a book printed."


Youghal Lights Up Blue To Mark World Drowning Prevention Day



Back to School advice in a Covid Climate from HSE.ie

To help prevent your child from catching or spreading a virus, teach them:

- how to wash their hands properly and regularly
- to always carry tissues and cover their mouth and nose with a tissue if they are coughing or sneezing
- to cough or sneeze into their bent elbow and then wash their hands, if they don't have a tissue
- to bin used tissues, then wash their hands
- not to share water bottles, cups, glasses or anything else they put into your mouth
- not to touch their eyes or nose when unwell
- to avoid close contact with anyone who you know has cold or flu symptoms

Make sure your child's vaccines or immunisations are up to date.

Some parents teach older children to 'dab' when they sneeze. Dabbing is a dance move in which a child drops their head into their bent elbow. This can be a fun way for your child to learn good hygiene when sneezing.

Going to school

All children should go to school unless they:

- have a temperature of 38 degrees Celsius or more
- have other common symptoms of COVID-19 - a new cough, loss or changed sense of taste or smell, or shortness of breath

- have been in close contact with someone who has COVID-19
- live with someone who is unwell and may have COVID-19
- have arrived back into Ireland from certain countries check gov.ie for the latest travel advice.


It is not common for a child to pass the virus on to other children in school. Children who do get the virus, usually get it from adults. This is particularly true for children under the age of 13.

Measures in schools to reduce the risk include:


- hand hygiene
- cleaning measures
- reduced mixing between children
- fewer objects going in and out of school
- face coverings for secondary school students - face coverings are not recommended for younger children

There is no reason a child with any of the following health conditions cannot go to school: - asthma, cystic fibrosis, diabetes, inflammatory bowel disease, neurodisability

But children may need to stay away from school if they have: recently had a transplant, severe immunodeficiency from very recent cancer treatment, unstable or severe cystic fibrosis. Their specialist can advise you if your child needs to take any extra precautions. Contact the specialist and GP straight away if your child gets COVID-19







Fr Liam Kelleher receives Cork City Sports Athletics award

With activity curtailed during the Covid lockdown, the Cork City Sports committee decided to give an award to Fr Liam Kelleher who has been actively involved in the sport as well as many other sports for the past 50 years. On Tuesday the 22nd of June the award was presented to Fr Liam. Present were Frank Walley President if the Cork City Sports. Tony O'Connell chairperson and Liam O'Brien technical director of the Cork City sports. Regrettably the prestigious Athletic event will not be held this year because of Covid.

But the situation is improving slowly and the National Track and Field Championships are down for decision on June 26th and 27th at Morton stadium in Santry. Ironically it was at that venue Liam O'Brien coached by Fr Liam won the first of his numerous National steeplechase titles. It was there the first Juvenile steeplechase event was ever held at National level. Liam went on to gain his first International in the Irish schools singlet. He went on to win 11 National senior steeplechase titles and his crowning glory was to make the Irish Olympic team in the event at the Los Angeles games on 1984 where he reached the semi final. He was a regular on the Irish team for many years and a testament to his longevity in the sport was the fact that when he was over 40, he represented his country in the Europa cup winning in 8.47, ahead of the Russian favourite.

Fr Liam made reference to Liam's glorious career, at the presentation and complimented him, on his achievements and his continued involvement in the sport at East Cork level and as chief organizer of Post Primary Athletics. A nice touch from Fr Liam, he thanked Liamo for bringing his own name to the fore for his coaching ability and now the wheel has turned full circle and both are still actively involved. Fr Liam also thanked Frank a former National sprint champion for his commitment to the sport through the Cork City sports, and for the wonderful work he has

done in Cobh, in helping restoring the iconic St Colman's cathedral. In fact the presentation was made outside the cathedral. He also complimented Tony who has played many roles in the Cork City sports including chairperson and PRO

Thanks

In reply they all thanked Fr Liam for his many years of dedication. From the grassroots during his time in Midleton in the early 70's when hundreds of young people were helped in the sport. The successes were amazing including taking 1st and 2nd team places in 2 ages in the All-Ireland x country championships. At schools level coaching St Mary's x country team to win the Junior and Intermediate All-Ireland school titles, on the same day, taking the ist, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places in the Junior under 15 race. He organized trips to Donegal and the West of Ireland In 1972 to Scotland in 1977 and to Crystal Palace London on a coaching course, Liam O'Brien was on those trips. Another trip is worthy of mention both of them headed off uninvited to an Olympic coaching course, at Louvain in Belgium where Olympic champion and world record holder for the steeplechase Gaston Roelants, was present he was a huge inspiration to both Liam and Fr Liam who was National steeplechase coach. The Midleton days ended in 1977, with the transfer to Tullylease a small village on the Limerick border with just 39 children in the primary school. Within the year, 4 athletes he coached with Christy Brosnan at nearby Dromcollogher won the first 4 races on the programme at the Munster xcountry, they needed a track to train on and that gave rise to a 400m all weather track in Tullylease. The international sports drew world class athletes like Olympic Champions John Walker and Steve Ovett and world champions Eamon Coghlan, John Treacy and Frank O'Mara and many other internationals including Liam O'Brien. Fr Liam was founding member of West Limerick AC.


